## How to find books

(printed **and** digital eBooks)

SEARCH THE LIBRARY CATALOG AT [HTTP://LIBRARY.MERCER.EDU](http://library.mercer.edu)

- **Swilley Library's** catalog lists books, theses, scores, microfilm, videos, DVDs, journals, but not the *contents* of journals! (Go to databases to search topics in journals.)
- Titles at Mercer's **Tarver Library** in Macon and at the **Regional Academic Centers** are listed in the catalog and may be requested online within the catalog.
- To find items at the **Mercer University School of Medicine** medical library, go to [http://medicine.mercer.edu/library\\_home](http://medicine.mercer.edu/library_home). These may be requested through Interlibrary Loan if Swilley does not have them.

## Electronic Books

Swilley Library has two databases that link to thousands of titles, **NetLibrary** and **eBrary**. Also, a score of full-text medical books are available to health sciences students in **GalN (Georgia Interactive Network)**. These databases are accessible from the library's homepage at "Find a Database." Individual eBook titles within these databases are listed, and linked from the library's catalog. Only a few pages of an eBook may be printed.

### NetLibrary

**NetLibrary** includes about 16,000 titles. Off campus access is available with the GALILEO password. (Get the GALILEO password at <http://library.mercer.edu/patroninfo>.) Browse an eBook online for a 15-minute interval or check out the eBook online, which allows you to look at it longer. **Important:** *You must create a NetLibrary account from a computer on campus before you can check out the title.* At a computer on the Mercer network, open NetLibrary in GALILEO and select "create a free account" to supply basic information, then choose a username and password. Your user account will also allow you to create a list of titles for quick reference and make notes on passages in the eBooks you have checked out. You can access these from the "My List and Notes" link whenever you are logged into your account.

### eBrary

Mercer's subscription to the **eBrary** database includes over 30,000 academic books and sheet music. You may browse a title online by clicking on an eBrary title listed in the library's catalog. Or "Find a Database" will open a link to all of eBrary. There is no time limit on reading or browsing. The software "eBrary Reader" is required to view eBrary eBooks, and is free to download as a plug-in to your computer's Web browser.

You do not need to create an account to view an item in eBrary, but if you do, you can customize it for your needs. Special features include:

- Highlight text and save your highlighted areas.
- Add comments to text and save them.
- Create your own bookshelf of favorite eBooks.
- Bookmark specific chapters or paragraphs within eBooks.
